Dear Chief Whetung-MacInnes:

***Williams Treaties First Nations – Reconciliation Fund planning and implementation:***

During the negotiation of the Williams Treaties First Nations Settlement Agreement (WTSA) it was recognized that certain priorities of the First Nations while not necessarily captured by the standard elements of a settlement claim would require compensation in the spirit of reconciliation. The overall objective was to address some of the reality that there were matters that did not ‘fit’ neatly under the umbrella that Canada and Ontario typically assess and compensate claims under but nevertheless were important to the First Nations in establishing.

As such, the negotiation team had instructions to negotiate an additional component of compensation to address a ‘reconciliation’ component. The reconciliation component was not based on legal or evidentiary arguments but rather approached from the perspective that there were certain matters that could not be substantiated under common approaches. We characterized these matters as a commitment to reconciliation to establish and address certain priorities of the First Nations.

As a result, the First Nations received compensation of a combined \$70 million dollars toward the fulfillment of priorities identified in negotiations as necessary tools in furthering reconciliation amongst the parties.

Each of the seven First Nations have passed Band Council Resolutions with respect to the reconciliation fund that in summary sets out the following:

- That upon receipt of payment of full compensation by both Ontario and Canada, each WTFN Chiefs and Councillors shall deposit into an account or trust on a date determined and agreed to by the seven Williams Treaties First Nations the amount of \$10,000,000.00.

- Following the execution of the Settlement Agreement, the Williams Treaties First Nations shall meet to develop the processes as to the Williams Treaties First Nations' priorities, use, access and administration of the Reconciliation Fund.
- The Reconciliation fund will be used for the purposes of developing, establishing and implementing the following reconciliation goals of the Williams Treaties First Nations' which may include:
  1. The establishment of a central and prominent memorial of Williams Treaties First Nations ensuring public commemoration of the history of their treaty and traditional territories;
  2. The establishment of a Williams Treaties First Nations Museum or repository to commemorate and house and protect historical artifacts, archaeological resources and associated training and staff requirements;
  3. Training of archaeological monitors to participate meaningfully in the protection and respectful repatriation of Williams Treaties First Nations' ancestral remains and possessions;
  4. The establishment of a central consultation office for the Williams Treaties First Nations with a specific development of a regional body represented by the seven Williams Treaties First Nations with a capacity building process for the individual First Nations that includes funding for training, staff, legal, technical, field specialists and archaeology, and associated equipment;
  5. Specific trail markers or signage in national and provincial crown lands and parks acknowledging and recognizing the history, treaty territories and traditional territories of the Williams Treaties First Nations.
  6. Language revitalization and the development and costs associated with language software i.e. Rosetta Stone;
  7. Treaty and cultural training awareness education for hospitals, school boards, CAS institutions within the Williams Treaties First Nations' traditional territories and treaty territories;
  8. The development and delivery of educational curriculum module for the Williams Treaties First Nations and general public student body to be (at a minimum) implemented in all public school boards within the Williams Treaties First Nations' treaty areas;
  9. The development of an agreed upon narrative for land acknowledgment to be utilized by municipalities, school boards, elected officials and dignitaries;
  10. The development and delivery of fishing, hunting and gathering training modules to the members of the Williams Treaties First Nations with a focus on youth and elder partnerships.
  11. PAL and FAC training;
  12. Educational component development for public awareness of treaty rights when applying for a hunting license or gun permit;
  13. Provide provincial hunting and fishing organizations with cultural awareness and treaty rights education and training;

14. Funds specifically dedicated in the areas of horticulture and agriculture to assist First Nation post-secondary students in the preservation of medicine plants and other culturally harvested forest products.

Throughout the ratification process, it was communicated to all WTFN members that this reconciliation fund would be established and controlled by the seven First Nations with a focus on the priorities identified by the communities collectively. The WTFN have been working on the implementation of the Williams Treaties Settlement Agreement in the area of lands, harvesting and their internal reconciliation objectives in accordance with the above.

At this time, the First Nations are in the process of developing a framework for the establishment of a central or regional consultation office as a first objective (highlighted above). The central office was identified as a priority as it is viewed as the means to implementing the other priorities identified as a matter of course. For example, the recognition of harvesting rights has resulted in an even greater level of consultation with the First Nations, the central office can serve as the database, GIS mapping and coordinating environmental assessment reviews and other experts as required. In addition, the repository and archaeological training can be administered from that location, the harvesting training and administration of mapping for harvesters, permission applications and data can be centralized for ease of access for First Nation, and language modules can be developed and delivered both centrally and regionally. In other words, all tasks identified can be implemented from a central office that takes direction from and supports First Nations.

The First Nations will be reviewing models at the February Chiefs Assembly and have scheduled an April 2020 General Assembly at which time they will provide an update on implementation activities to its members, including the WTFN reconciliation fund.

## Coronavirus and You: How to Stay Safe and Remain Calm

*Peterborough Area Healthcare Partners Share Precautions for Local Residents*

While the risk remains low, local healthcare partners have infection prevention and control measures in place to protect the community should there be a confirmed local case of the novel coronavirus.

“Travel history to China remains a key factor in determining the risk of illness, and Canadian airports are doing a great job of informing their passengers about the coronavirus which protects all of us,” said Dr. Rosana Salvaterra, Medical Officer of Health. “There are two main things local residents can do to protect themselves while this situation unfolds: practice good respiratory etiquette, and stay informed with credible websites.”

On January 27, local healthcare partners including Peterborough Regional Health Centre, Peterborough Family Health Team, Peterborough Public Health, Peterborough County-City Paramedics, and Peterborough Public Health Lab, gathered to review infection control measures, access to testing, and communication flow during this period of heightened attention about the novel coronavirus. Together, they encourage residents to bear the following in mind:

### Current Status of Novel Coronavirus

Two cases of suspected novel Coronavirus are currently under investigation in Toronto. Ontario’s Chief Medical Officer of Health has stated that the risk to Ontarians remains low. Healthcare providers in Peterborough are working together to make it as easy as possible for anyone at risk of having an illness related to this virus to safely and quickly access testing and care. This is an evolving situation – for up-to-date information, go to [www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca](http://www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca).

### Travelled to China and Feeling Unwell?

Peterborough residents who become ill with a fever and cough AND have either travelled to Hubei province in China in the past 14 days or have had close contact with an ill person who is either under investigation for novel coronavirus or is a confirmed case, please identify yourself to the Healthcare System in the following manner:

- If you have severe symptoms (shortness of breath, chest pain, abdominal pain, confusion, loss of consciousness/semi-consciousness, severe or persistent vomiting): Call 911 and identify your symptoms

and travel history/contact history to the dispatcher so that our paramedics can ensure they are appropriately prepared when they arrive.

- If you have less severe symptoms (mild cough, runny nose, sneezing, etc.): Please remain at home and contact Peterborough Public Health (PPH) at **705-743-1000, ext. 401** to confirm whether you should be tested. PPH will coordinate your follow-up and provide you with guidance to access care safely and quickly.

### **No Travel History and Feeling Unwell?**

Respiratory Illnesses are common at this time of year and the majority are caused by viruses like other coronaviruses and influenza viruses. Generally, they spread from person to person through droplets from coughing and sneezing, contact with surfaces, and on your hands. Washing your hands, with either a sanitizer or soap and water, is one of the most effective ways to prevent transmission. Most of these illnesses are best treated by staying home, getting rest, drinking plenty of fluids and using over-the-counter medications as needed to ease symptoms.

### **Coming to the Emergency Department (ED) with Respiratory Illness?**

If you require urgent care and have a fever or cough, please: put on a mask and use the hand sanitizer available inside the entrance to the ED. If you have recently travelled, please clean your hands and inform the triage nurse immediately.

Patients at high risk of complications from influenza should seek medical care by calling 911 if symptoms are severe (shortness of breath, chest pain or abdominal pain, confusion, severe or persistent vomiting etc.). Antivirals, if taken early, can reduce influenza symptoms, even in patients who have had their flu shot. Patients at high-risk of influenza complications should phone their primary care provider to access a same day or urgent hours assessment. Phoning ahead will help the office staff to take steps to arrange an appointment that limits potential exposure to other patients and staff members.

# Incomes Too Low for Many Peterborough Residents to Put Food on the Table

## *Peterborough Public Health Releases New Report: Limited Incomes: No Money for Food is Cent\$less*



Peterborough Public Health has released its [latest report](#) looking at incomes in relation to the local cost of food and housing. This report shows that after paying for food and housing alone, there is little, if any money left over for many residents.

“This doesn’t come as a surprise,” said Lauren Kennedy, Registered Dietitian at Peterborough Public Health. “Although we have seen an increase in the cost of food this year, the problem is not food costs. The bottom line is that incomes are too low.” For example, Kennedy noted, healthy food costs for a single 40-year-old man are calculated to be \$315 per month. If this man is receiving Ontario Works benefits, 38% of his monthly income would be needed for food. After paying for food and shelter costs, he would be in a deficit of \$224 each month. This is also *before* paying for other costs of living such as utilities, phone, cleaning supplies, clothing, medical costs, and transportation. This illustrates how people are forced to cut their food budgets for other necessities.

“When people don’t have enough money to afford food, they are more vulnerable to health problems and chronic diseases,” said Kennedy. “This also puts a strain on the healthcare system, and is linked with higher annual healthcare costs.”

Getting to the root of the problem in Peterborough means addressing inadequate incomes. An important strategy to help residents put food on the table is through social assistance rates that match the cost of living, and policies such as a [basic income guarantee](#). Another important strategy is local uptake of [Peterborough’s 2019 living wage](#), and for Peterborough employers to become [certified living wage employers](#).

Kennedy added, “Working towards increasing incomes is critical if we want to see long-term improvements in nutrition, health, and well-being in our community.”

The role of the Agricultural Advisory Committee will be as follows:

## **“The Story of the *S.S. Keewatin*: 112 Years of Steamboat History and the Rescue of this Maritime Treasure.”**

### **Eric Conroy**

Built in 1907, *S.S. Keewatin* was one of several passenger steamships ordered for the Canadian Pacific Great Lakes fleet. Taken out of service in 1967, she was rescued from the scrap yard to become a marine museum in Michigan for 45 years. When threatened again, *S.S. Keewatin* was again saved, this time to return to Canada to be a museum in Port McNicoll, her former home port, where she remains today. **Eric Conroy** served as a teenage waiter aboard the *S.S. Keewatin*. After a career as a marketer, entrepreneur and publisher, he is currently President and C.E.O. of Friends of Keewatin, a charitable foundation dedicated to the ship's preservation.
